It takes a lot of planning for its execution, but the Joy experienced by our Vincentians and the recipients is gratifying. Our celebration of Christmas, and its many traditions, stems from us recognizing and praising the birth of Our Lord, who was born among us and became man. Jesus told us that his "reason for coming as a man" is, "He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor". Jesus brought the Good News back to earth: the desire of God to give people life (joy) and true freedom (unity), to bring healing for past and present wounds (shelter). St. Paul reminds us that we cannot achieve unity and be prosperous unless we bring healing, hope and freedom to all members in our communities. This also includes all members of our Conferences and our Councils. St. Paul shares that, "we are all part of ONE body and if one part of the body is suffering, eventually, the whole body will suffer".

On January 19th, in the "Second Reading", St. Paul says to the Corinthians, "there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit", then continues with, "to each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good". The gifts of the Holy Spirit which we receive during the Sacrament of Confirmation are diverse, but the Holy Spirit is one. These gifts that are given to us are all different and also different

A Jesuit priest once explained "Mercy": "to be merciful is to enter into the chaos of another person's life." This is a good thing to remember, because it's exactly what Jesus did. May we also look within ourselves and see what **gift/ability or opportunity** has been given to you by the Holy Spirit, then ask yourself how you may share/use that **gift** to help others to "see again" and find "true freedom". Once this is accomplished, all can be content that by serving Christ in the poor with love, respect, justice and joy, we are encompassing our SSVP mission.

My fellow Sister and Brother Vincentians, the year 2025 is a Jubilee Year for our Church. In his prayer for us, Pope Francis extends the following, "May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope, a yearning for the treasures of heaven. May that same grace spread the joy and peace of our Redeemer throughout the earth. To you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever.

Amen". And in this Jubilee Year, we are invited to experience the power of God's mercy and forgiveness by a renewed commitment to love God and our neighbour as God has first loved us.
